Research & Services

Updates — Programs locally

A greater understanding of how altered cell calcium handling contributes to impaired brain cell function in Batten disease.

Alexandra Grubman and Anthony White, Department of Pathology, University of Melbourne

Recent research from the US and Australia is shedding light on how brain cell function is impaired in some forms of Batten disease. Scientific work published by the teams of Susan Cotman at Harvard Medical School, USA, and Anthony White at University of Melbourne, Australia have shown that in CLN3 and CLN6 forms of Batten disease, the important element calcium is not handled correctly by brain cells. The mis-handling of calcium leads to impairment of key cellular processes designed to remove 'junk' proteins in the cell, resulting in accumulation of these proteins and other cell components, and neuronal cell damage. Susan Cotman's group has found that when the CLN3 protein function is impaired, this leads to abnormal movement and storage of calcium in neurons, resulting in defective autophagy, a process where the cell removes unwanted material. In closely related work, Alexandra Grubman and Anthony White have shown that neurons with impaired CLN6 protein function also have dramatic changes to handling of both calcium and zinc, and that control of the two elements is closely related. Treatment of neurons with a zinc delivery compound was able to substantially restore normal calcium handling in CLN6 cells suggesting that there may be potential in developing therapeutic approaches based on control of zinc and/or calcium handling in neurons.

The National Referral Laboratory (Adelaide, South Australia) has recently expanded it's genetic testing for Batten disease. In addition to testing already offered for the genes associated with infantile (CLN1), late-infantile (CLN2) and juvenile (CLN3) Batten disease, we are pleased to announce we have increased our scope and are now using Next Generation Sequencing technologies to also test for CLN4 (DNAJC5), CLN5, CLN6, CLN7 (MFSD8), CLN8, CLN10 (CTSD), CLN11 (GRN), CLN12 (ATP13A2) and CLN14 (KCTD7). Since introducing this new testing, we have diagnosed our first-ever CLN6 patient. We hope this extended testing can help others with suspected Batten disease to achieve a definitive diagnosis. - The **estimated completion date of this study** is March 2016
- ♦ In January 2015 BioMarin Pharmaceutical Inc. announced interim results from its Phase 1/2 pivotal study for BMN 190— interim data indicates that in all nine of the BMN 190 patients who have been followed for at least six months and up to 15 months, the treatment appears to show stabilization of the disease compared to the natural history based on a standardized measure of motor and language function .
